After watching:

CONVERSATION:

Split into small groups and discuss:

- Look at the mind map you created before the programme. What is similar and/or different in comparison to the programme? Have you learned anything new about South Africa? What? Tell your friends in the group.
- Now, make a new mind map where you talk about differences and similarities between South Africa and Sweden. Talk about your new mind map with the rest of your class.
- Try to find some of the different environments of South Africa on a map. Where can you find the coast? Townships? Harbours?

Talk in full class:

- What surprised you in the programme?
- What do you think it's like being a teenager in South Africa? Discuss considering the different aspects of life in South Africa what would it be like to be living in a township? In one of the more privileged areas? Being white/black?

Extra:

- Write an advertisement for a company that arranges boat cruises along the coast of South Africa. Remember that descriptions of the environment are important!
- Pretend you are a documentary film maker making your own movie about something in South Africa. Work with a friend and record a scene from your movie with your cell phone. Use a free green screen app to add a scenery from South Africa so that it looks like you're there. Try to mimic South African English when you speak.
- Make a newspaper edition about South Africa together in class. Work in pairs or groups of threes and cover a different topic. Here are some different topics you can work on;
