• Boston marathon explosions

CD: Two explosions at the Boston marathon killed three people and seriously injured over 140 people in April.

The blasts went off close to the finish line. The city was shut down as police searched for those responsible.

Residents were told not to leave their homes, public transport was stopped and schools and offices were closed.

Two brothers, 19-year old Dzhokhar Tsarnaev and Tamerlan, 26, were the main suspects.

Dzhokhar will go on trial next year and could face the death penalty. His brother Tamelan was killed in a shoot-out with police.

• Sir Alex set to retire

In May, Alex Ferguson announced that he would retire as manager of football club Manchester United after 27 years.

He made a speech at the club's last home game of the season. Listen to what he says.

"I have been very fortunate; I have been able to manage some of the greatest players in the country, let alone Manchester United.

"My retirement doesn't mean the end of my life with the club – I'll be able to now enjoy watching them, rather than suffer with them. You have been the most fantastic experience of my life – thank you."

Ferguson, who is 71 years old and comes from Scotland, won 49 trophies in his career. He is the most successful manager in British football history.

• Miley on making history

CD: Pop star Miley Cyrus hit the headlines in August after a performance at the MTV Video Music Awards.

The 21-year-old was joined on stage by artist Robin Thicke and she was criticised for her outfit and her sexy dancing, called twerking.

• Welcome to Sweden Mr President

CD: The US president Barack Obama made his first official visit to Sweden in September.

During his short stay in Stockholm, he met with the Swedish Prime Minister Fredrik Reinfeldt to discuss political relations between the two countries.

Listen to what Obama had to say.

"This is truly one of the world's great cities. It is spectacularly beautiful and so like so many who have come here I feel Stockholm in my heart and I'm sure that I will want to bring my family back to have a visit sometime in the future."

Obama also visited the capital's Royal Institute of Technology to take a look at Swedish innovations that help the environment.

He stayed overnight at the Grand Hotel and also had lunch at the Royal Palace with the king and queen.

• Nairobi survivor speaks out

CD: In September, terrorists attacked a shopping centre in Nairobi, the capital of Kenya, killing 67 people.

The siege lasted four days. A woman who survived the attack spoke about the ordeal.

Lynsey Khatau, who is originally from the UK, was with her husband and son at the Westgate shopping centre when Islamist militants opened fire.

shoot. They shot everyone in front of us. We just ran. We just ran."

The Somali terrorist group Al-Shabab claimed responsibility for the attack. Kenya has soldiers in Somalia that are fighting with militants.

Lynsey Khatau does not feel safe living in Nairobi anymore.

"It's going to happen again. And I need to go home. I just need to go back for safety. Just to be with my family."

• Malala wins human rights award

CD: Malala Yousafzai, the teenage activist from Pakistan, won a top human rights award in October.

The 16-year-old campaigns for better rights for girls in her home country, including the right to education.

In 2012, she was shot by the Taliban for speaking out against the political regime in her country.

Listen to what she says.

"I spoke for education and it means that I am speaking against the Taliban because speaking for education means you are speaking against the Taliban because they are against education. And I spoke for that. I was not waiting for someone else neither was I asking the government. I said I will do it."

Malala survived the shooting and has become a symbol of girl's and women's rights around the world.

For her work, she won this year's European Union human rights award. Previous winners include South Africa's Nelson Mandela and Aung San Suu Kyi in Burma.

• **Philippines devastated by typhoon** CD: A powerful typhoon caused devastation in the Philippines in November.

Over 5,000 were killed and many others were left homeless.

Towns and cities were torn down and at first it was difficult getting food and water as well as medical help to the people worst affected.

Listen to this woman who survived the typhoon.
