• Passports “for sale” in Malta

CD: The government in Malta wants to sell citizenship. That means that if you pay money, you will be able to get a Maltese passport.

It will cost a lot – 650,000 Euros.

Some politicians in Malta think it’s a good idea because it will help to bring money into the country.

But others say you shouldn’t be able to buy a Maltese passport if you don’t live in the country.

Malta is in the European Union. It is the smallest country in the EU and there are only around 450,000 people living there.

• Too hot for tennis?

CD: Tennis players at the Australian Open tournament in Melbourne have been playing in temperatures over 40 degrees Celsius.

It’s winter here in Europe, but it is summer in Australia. Some matches have been stopped because it’s too hot to play and some players have even been ill because they are not used to the heat.

Tennis fans have been trying to keep cool. Listen to this tennis fan from Melbourne who spoke to the BBC about the weather.

It is very hot at the moment but Melbourne is like that– in January it can be extreme heat but a week ago it was cold so it just depends what week you’re here. Next week it will be cooler.
