• **Schools for Syrian children**

**Presenter:**

Countries need to give more money so that Syrian children, who are refugees, can go to school.

That's what Malala Yousafzai told Prime Ministers and Presidents from around the world.

Malala, who is 18, years old won the Nobel Peace Prize in 2014. She believes all children should be able to go to school.

There are around 5 million Syrian refugees. They left their country because of war. Around 700,000 of them are children.

Malala was speaking at a meeting in London. Listen to what she says.

**Malala:**

Today my goal was to ask our world leaders to pledge 1.4 billion dollars to the education of Syrian refugee children because how can we think of a brighter Syria if these 700,000 children right now are out of school.

After the meeting, world leaders said they would give more money to help Syrian refugees.

Children in parts of Australia have not been able to go to school because of bushfires. Bushfires happen in the summer in Australia. It's so hot there that fires that start in forests spread quickly into towns.
