Presenter:

A man in England ran 401 marathons in 401 days.

Ben Smith, who is 34 years old, also raised a lot of money - 250,000 pounds. He is going to give it to anti-bullying charities.

Ben was bullied when he was at school. Listen to what he told the BBC.

Ben Smith:

The bullying got so bad when I was at school that at the age of 18 I tried to take my own life. It wasn't a cry for help I just genuinely didn't want to be here.

Presenter:

Ben thinks it is important to talk about bullying. During his marathons he stopped to visit schools around the UK to talk to children.

Ben Smith:

(To children) Do we think bullying is good or bullying is bad?

Running gave me back my confidence and it gave me back my self-esteem and helped me deal with a lot of the stuff that had happened in the past. And I'm grateful for that.

• **Nobel winner Bob Dylan**

Presenter:

Bob Dylan has won this year's Nobel Prize in Literature. It's a bit of a surprise because rather than writing books, he writes songs.

Dylan is from America and is 75 years old. Some people think it's great that a songwriter has won a prize for writing good lyrics – others think only authors should be able to win.

Dylan's Award will be presented in Stockholm on December 10.

• **Pedal power**

A maths teacher in the US wanted to find a way to help students to concentrate in the classroom. So she put small bikes under the desks so they can pedal during lessons.
