Curious grammar facts

Did you notice, when listening to this week's episode, that the verb following the band name *Pentakill* is a **plural** verb and not a singular one, i.e. "*Pentakill aren't* your usual band"?

In this case, the band name *Pentakill* is considered a so-called collective noun. A **collective noun** is a noun that is used to denote a group of people or things. In British English, collective nouns are generally considered plural and are therefore followed by verbs in the plural. Hence, "*Pentakill aren't* your usual band".

In North-American English, however, collective nouns are generally followed by singular verbs unless the noun itself **sounds** plural. Hence, in North-American English, the band *The Rolling Stones* would be followed by a plural verb because the name **sounds** plural but the band name *Pentakill* would, in North-American English, be followed by a singular verb because it does not have a plural sound.

Discussion points

Social media powers:

In this week's episode, we hear about the Nigerian government banning Twitter for removing a presidential tweet that was considered in breach of Twitter's rules against abusive behaviour. Earlier this year, former President Donald Trump's Twitter account was permanently suspended after riots on Capitol Hill.

- Do you think that closing individual people's accounts on social media is a breach of freedom of speech? Are there situations when it may be justified?
- Many social media platforms are operated by profit-driven corporations. Can these global corporations ban specific people/images/values as they wish, or should they live by other standards than other corporations and take responsibility for, for example, freedom of speech?
- Some social media have proven to have played significant roles in political and historical events, for example in the Arab Spring some 10 years ago. Can you think of other important events in which social media have played significant roles?
- What is your relationship to social media? If you use it, what do you mostly use it for?

Climate change consequences:

In this week's episode, we hear about a report that has shown that the increase in extreme winter weather events in the US is linked to global warming and how this can be traced back to temperature rises in the Arctic, which in turn can be traced back to carbon dioxide and greenhouse gas emissions.

These results comply well with the IPCC report (Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change) that you might have heard of. It states that "the changes observed in the climate are unprecedented in thousands, if not hundreds of thousands of years, and some of the changes already set in motion—such as continued sea level rise—are irreversible over hundreds to thousands of years".

- Have you noticed unusual weather patterns where you live? Could they be explained by climate change or is it something other do you think?
- What should be done to stop climate change? On an individual level? On a political level? On a global level?
- Has climate change affected your life in any way? Do you do things differently now than you did some years for climate change reasons?

Preying on predators:

According to the programme, biodiversity in New Zealand has suffered from the introduction of predators, the multiple numbers of which put several other species at risk of becoming endangered.

- Do you agree with the method of attempting to eradicate specific species in order to maintain biodiversity and to protect indigenous species from going extinct? Why or why not? Can you think of less radical ways of maintaining biodiversity?
- The predators exemplified in the programme are so-called invasive species, i.e. they are animals from another region of the world that do not belong in their new environment. Do you know of any invasive species (plants or animals) in your own part of the world that have either assimilated to their new ecosystem, or that have been eradicated, or that are still being fought?
 - There are predatory species that although native to the habitat they are in, are still considered to cause ecological and economic harm. In Sweden, for example, wolves are seen by some as harmful predators that need to be eradicated, and by others as a native species that needs to be protected. Whose interests should take priority do you think? According to statistics from the Country Administrative Board, 150 sheep, 50 cattle and 19 dogs were attacked by wolves in 2019. Is that reason to eradicate wolves? Why or why not?

Teachers' note

Questions for working with the photo on page 1:

- What seems to be going on in the photo? Describe the scene to one of your friends. What do you think the context is? What type of animal is being handled and what are the people doing with it?
- Imagine that the photo were in a newspaper and you are the editor. Put together a headline and caption (bildtext) to it.

1. Suggestion: Twitter argued that the President's tweet violated its rules against abusive behavior.
