Discussion points

Truth and Reconciliation:

In this week's episode, we learn about the Canadian Truth and Reconciliation Commission, which seeks to provide anyone who has been affected by residential schools with an opportunity to tell their story. A similar Truth and Reconciliation Commission was established in South Africa after the abolishment of apartheid in 1994. The purpose of these commissions is not to determine guilt or innocence, but to create a historical account of wrongdoing and to help people heal and encourage reconciliation between groups.

- Considering the degree of violations perpetrated against Indigenous peoples in Canadian residential schools and against South Africans during apartheid, do you think that opportunities for sharing experiences without determining guilt or innocence is an effective way of healing a nation? If yes, explain your answer. If no, what would be a better alternative?
- Why do you think these Truth and Reconciliation Commissions are not about determining guilt or innocence?
- When whole governments are guilty of violating people's basic human rights, what can be done about it? Discuss.
- Are governments above the law or can they be brought to justice? Search for more information on the matter.

Thrifting for a sustainable living:

Online second-hand stores have become extremely popular in India and in many other parts of the world for various reasons. For example, they contribute to more sustainable consumption.
