Got more time and feeling creative? Write a formal email

A formal email is something you write to perhaps your boss or a person that you haven't met before. Here is a list of things to include in your email, in this order:

- First, write the subject of your email. (This goes in the subject line in a real email.)
- Write a greeting to the reader.
- Write the body of your message. You should have a clear purpose.
- Write a closing to end the message (e.g., Sincerely/Respectfully/Best wishes...)

Examples of emails you could write:

- An email to your teacher, asking them to show you more videos from UR.
- An email to your imaginary boss, asking for time off.
- An email to your rich aunt, whom you haven't seen since you were five years old, asking for money.
