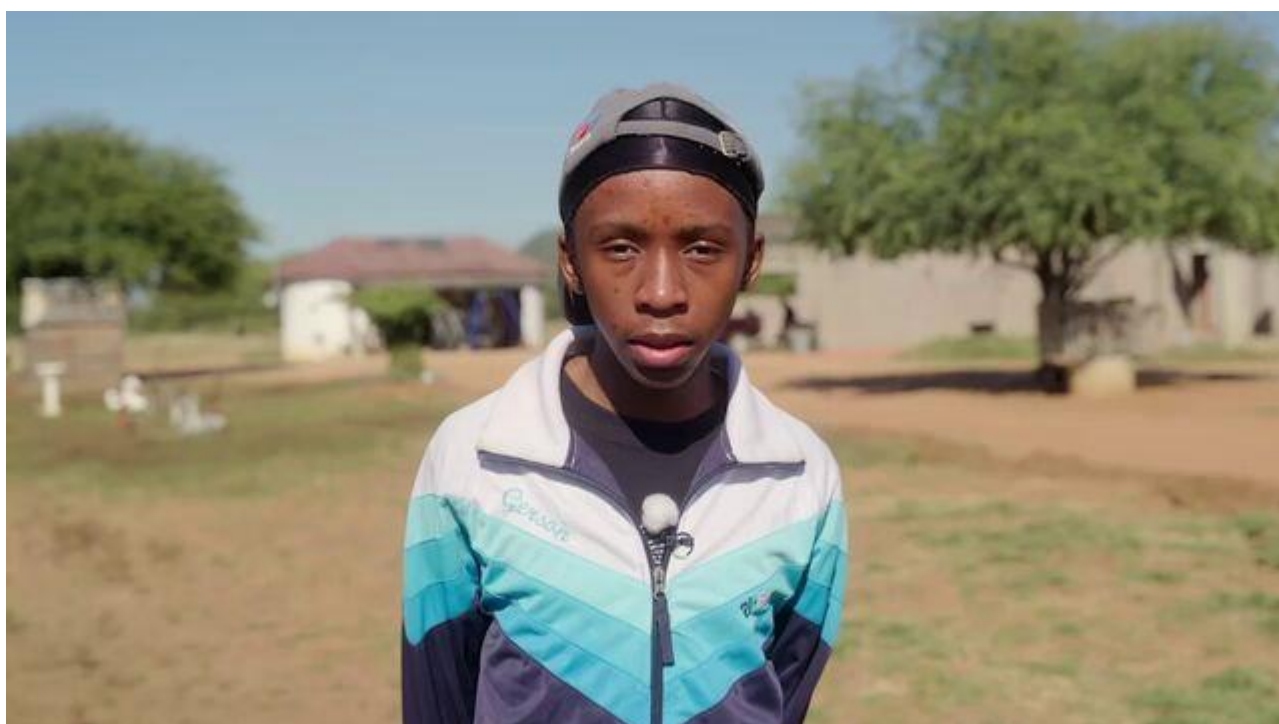

Irregular verbs

When Noel talked about his experience in the classroom, he said: “the teacher **bringed** me to the front of the classroom”. In fact, the simple past form of bring is **brought**. It is an irregular verb – a verb that does not follow the “-ed-rule”.

Here is a list of more irregular verbs:

Fact: Education in Botswana

In Botswana there are both public schools and private schools. Most students go to public schools and about 10 % go to private schools. Approximately 3 percent are home-schooled.

Primary education is compulsory from about five to eight years of age and continues for 10 years. After that, the student earns a Junior Certificate qualification.

Secondary education is not compulsory and it is not free.

Go online and search for information about the school system in Botswana. You might also want to go to the Maru-a-Pula School website, where you can learn loads about the school Noel will visit in the next episode. Share your findings with a friend.

Discussion: Fears and comfort zones

In the episode they talk about different fears, such as social anxiety. Social anxiety is when you have a fear of social situations. They also talk about “stepping out of your comfort zone”, “breaking walls” and “opening gates” in their conversation on Kgale Hill.

Now it's your turn to talk about these issues. Talk in pairs. (Questions 3–5 are quite personal, so please remember that you don't have to share if you don't feel like it.)

1. What do you think “breaking walls” and “opening gates” refer to?
2. What are people usually afraid of?
3. Do you have a specific fear? If so, would you like to share it?
4. Do you ever feel nervous or shy? When has it happened? Why do you think you felt shy at that moment?
5. Have you ever stepped out of your comfort zone? What did you do? How did it feel in the moment? How did it feel afterwards?
6. Are there some things that are good to be afraid of?

Online assignment: Animal facts

In Botswana there are many animals, such as zebras, meerkats and giraffes. Something that is called The Big Five can be found here. The Big Five consists of lion, leopard, elephant, rhino and buffalo.

Work with a friend:

- Go online and look up animals that you can find in Botswana. Pick **one** of the animals and write down some facts about it. Here are some facts you can include:
 - Habitat (where they live)
 - Lifespan (how long they live)
 - Appearance (what they look like)
 - Size (what size they are)
 - Weight (how much they weigh)
 - Diet (what they eat)
 - Threats and protection (if they are endangered and what is being done to protect them)
- Then find another pair of classmates in the classroom and tell each other about the animal you have picked.
- Remember when Noel said that he thought the turkey was a peacock? What is the difference between the two birds? Go online and find out. Take turns in describing each of the birds.

Want a written version of this task? Write a text about your animal, using the facts you found online.

Farm animal version: do the same for the farm animals mentioned in the episode; goat, pig, chicken, turkey, cow, or dog.

Written assignment

Choose one of the following assignments.

- **Write a longer summary of the episode.** Try to write at least 150 words about what happened in the episode. Use the past tense.
- **Write a diary entry pretending to be either Reo or Noel.** What happened during the day? What was it like? What did they think of their new friend?
- **Rewrite the episode into a short story.** Use the fact box as support.
- **Write an essay about “*How to overcome fear*”** Use the fact box as support.

An essay

An essay is a text in which you try to inform, persuade, explain and entertain. First you write an introduction in which you present your idea. After that you write the body, with arguments and examples. In the end you write the conclusion in which you wrap up your ideas. Here you have a basic outline for an essay in points:

- Introduction (in which you present what you are writing about)
- Idea 1 with examples (here you write about an idea that can help someone to overcome fear)
- Idea 2 with examples
- Conclusion (where you summarise your ideas and try to write a good ending to your essay, perhaps something inspirational)

A short story

Every short story has a beginning, middle and an end. In the beginning there are presentations of the characters and the conflict. The conflict usually deepens in the middle and in the end, there is a solution. Here are some questions to guide you:

- Who are the characters (people in the story) and what are they like?
- What is the setting (the time and the place)?
- Is there a conflict or problem that needs to be solved?
- What important events are there in the episode? Which ones do you want in your story?
- How does the story end? Does the conflict get solved? How?
