### **Discussion points**

#### Indigenous people around the world

In today's program we heard about the Indigenous Australians and First Nations people. Even though they were there first, they are still fighting for the right to have their voices heard in their own country.

- Who do you think should decide on matters concerning the Indigenous people? Do you agree with Ben Abbatangelo who said that the Indigenous should not just advice decision makers but make the decisions themselves? Give reasons for your way of thinking.
- One Indigenous leader claimed that colonisation had been good for First Nations rendering the Voice unnecessary. What do you think his reasons are for saying this? What counterarguments do you think he might get?
- Get together in small groups of three to four students. Research other Indigenous groups of people in other places around the world. Make sure to include the Indigenous people of Sweden, the Sámi. What differences and similarities can you find regarding the rights of the Indigenous population and the relationship they have with the locals? Once your research is complete, split up your group and share your findings with two to three new group members. Finish by summarizing your discussions with the whole class.

#### Music and culture

Afropop music with its origins in West Africa is spreading quickly all over the world. In the program today we heard how closely connected Afropop is to the Nigerian culture, making it truly unique.

- What would you say is typically Swedish music? Do we have a music genre that is similarly connected to our culture and way of life in your opinon? If yes, could you give an example of this music? If no, do you think it would be nice to have such a music genre in Sweden? What kind of music do you think people associate with Sweden? What kind of music are we famous for?
- Take a look at your favorite playlist on Spotify or Apple Music. Where does your favorite music come from? Which countries? Compare your playlist with two of your classmates. What differences and similarities can you find regarding the origin of the music? What factors do you think contribute to our choice of music?
- Afropop seems to be particularly popular with young people. How does the music you listen to compare to the music your parents listened to when they were young? Is there a difference in style or genre?

- What kind of directions do you think he is given by the producer?
- Work in pairs. Try to capture the answers to the above questions by creating speech bubbles to go with the photo.

#### **KEY**

- 1. The vote was about whether the constitution should be changed to recognise the rights of Indigenous Australians.
- 2. It would have led to the creation of a body called the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice. This body would have had a say on policy affecting Indigenous Australians.
- 3. There is a long history of maltreatment of the Indigenous Australians in Australia and many would argue that the Indigenous Australians were there first and should therefore have a say in all political matters.
- 4. Once the referendum was announced, the opposition decided they were going to vote against it. Before it was voted on, the question of whether to give the Indigenous Australians their voice became very political and misinformation, mainly from white Australians, was spread arguing against the voice.
- 5. Ben is a First Nation writer and advocate. He was against the voice and sees the outcome as positive. The reason is that he feels the Indigenous Australians should be involved in making the decisions and not just advice decision makers.
- 6. She considered it a wake-up call because she wasn't prepared for the degree of resistance this referendum would have in this day and age.
- 7. The 'word of the year' is AI (Artificial Intelligence).
- 8. The company's managing director, Alex Beecroft, said that the growht of Artificial Intelligence has meant that its abbreviation, AI, has become "ubiquitous and embedded in our lives".
- 9. Other words included 'Greedflation', referring to when companies use high inflation as an excuse to raise prices, and 'Nepo baby', meaning a person whose success could be said to be linked to having famous family members.
- 10. Narayana Murthy is an Indian software billionaire who proposes that young people should work 70 hour weeks in order to improve the country's productivity.
- 11. People are saying that he isn't taking work-life balance into account.
- 12. In contrast to Narayana Murthy, in other parts of the world people are re-evaluating what is important in life after the pandemic, with some countries considering a four day working week.
- 13. A soap treating skin cancer has been developed. It is made from compounds which reactivate a type of cell that guards the human skin.
- 14. The scientists name is Heman Bekele. He is from Ethiopia, which is also where he got the idea for his invention, as he watched people work in the sun all day.
- 15. The music industry is estimated to generate over 2 billion dollars.
- 16. The reason is said to be the genre Afropop, which was pioneered by Nigerian artists.
- 17. The artists used their music to raise awareness about political and social issues.
- 18. Descriptive/qualitative adjectives: young, First Nations, writer, advocate.
- 19. Distributive adjective: every.
- 20. Limiting adjective: some. Compound adjective: four-day.
