The children's charity Barnardo's has been asking people across Britain because it's 30 years since the World Wide Web (sort-of like an early internet) began.

I went to find out how some kids in London think they'll be chatting in 2049.

Child 2: I think we'll be talking through some new version of the phone or something, talking through like holograms.

A hologram is like a moving picture that's displayed in the air. So, some young people think we'll be using holograms and a whole new language. But how do you think we'll be talking in the future?

Well, here in London there's a huge sale of props from famous films taking place. And they're expected to sell for more than six million pounds.

It's a big auction – that's where people buy things by bidding against each other, and the highest bidder wins. And this one includes all sorts of things, from masks to letters.

I went to a cinema to see what's up for sale and to meet Sian who works for the company selling them. Sian told me she thinks the best item is a model dinosaur.

SIAN: I think my favourite has got to be the baby Tyrannosaurus Rex from Jurassic Park: Lost world.

KATE: How much do you expect something like that to sell for?

SIAN: They're probably a couple of thousand pounds.

Two-thousand pounds for a model dinosaur! And Harry Potter's letter from Hogwarts will be sold for even more. But who will buy them?

SIAN: Anyone who has grown up loving a film. Will instantly feel an attraction to something in the auction. And even some museums are interested in getting stuff for their archives too.

Museums also like to collect film props.

KATE: I spotted some of the costumes from Batman and they are beautiful. If someone buys something like that, is it likely that they will ever wear it?

SIAN: Our Batman costume is 30 years old. It's made of a rubber and it's getting a little bit delicate now, just through age. But something like a top hat? I'm sure the owner will probably wear that at some point.

Sian says it's up to the new owner whether they wear the costume or not. Especially if it's old and might get damaged. But a top hat? Well that's very likely to be worn.
