LGBT+ History Month

February is LGBT+ history month. That stands for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and others.

The awareness month is a chance to look back at some of the struggles and progress made by the LGBT+ community over time.

In England and Wales, it was illegal for two men to be in a relationship until 1967.

Then in 1972 - fifty years ago - the very first Pride march in the UK took place.

I spoke to Daniel, who came out as gay when he was 14.

You went to your first Pride March at 14. What was that like?

Daniel: It was a strange experience because I'd come out of the closet about three weeks before to my mum. And then my mum took me to Pride. It's a world that I'd never seen before, but I felt instantly a part of so it was a really exciting experience.

How easy or difficult was it for you to come out?

Daniel: I had a really supportive family. So it was easy compared to many other people, but I think anybody who has come out knows that it's the hardest thing in the world to do.

But ultimately, I knew in my heart that it was the absolute right thing to do and that I needed to do it

What was the best thing about coming out for you?

Daniel: The sense of relief that you feel after four or five years of knowing that I was different and keeping that secret and then giving that secret away was amazing.

I also spoke to Carrie, who came out as bisexual when they were 16, and identifies as non-binary.

Carrie, do you think things have got better for the LGBT+ community over the last 50 years?
