*This is BBC News from London, Buckingham Palace has announced the death of her majesty Queen Elizabeth II*

The death of Elizabeth II, Britain's Queen, was announced at 6.30pm on Thursday 8th September.

She had been on the throne for more than 70 years, making her the UK's longest ruling monarch.

As the Queen, she represented the UK but her role was mainly ceremonial.

Her son, Charles, has been declared the new king. He told the people of the UK in his first speech as king:

*I shall endeavor to serve you with loyalty, respect and love, as I have throughout my life.*

## Young people react to the death of Queen Elizabeth II

The Queen died at Balmoral castle in Scotland where she usually stayed during the summer months.

But thousands of people have been visiting one of her other homes in London, Buckingham Palace, to leave flowers and pay their respects.

### *God Save the King*

Some people have been celebrating the new king, King Charles III, by shouting 'God Save the King' outside Buckingham Palace and singing the national anthem.

I went to the Palace to speak to some young people to find out what they thought of the Queen's death and the future of the UK monarchy.

I spoke to Owen, who is 19, who was visiting Buckingham Palace with his friend.

*Kate: What was your reaction when you heard that the Queen had died?*

*Owen: So it's obviously very sad. But I think, you know, the amount of people that are coming here, the crowds shows just how much people loved her. And I think it's really nice to see all the tribute.*

*Kate: What did you think about the Queen?*

*Owen: She was a wonderful person. Obviously, she was a real role model for a lot of people. And I think it's, you know, it says a lot about her as a person that nobody here probably has met her but yet everyone comes to see the tributes, to see the palace, to see everything.*

*Kate: Do you think the monarchy will survive now that Charles is king?*

*Owen: I don't think he'll get the same respect that the Queen's had but I think the future of the monarchy should be okay.*

I spoke to Owen's friend Sadie who is also 19 years old. I asked her what her reaction was when she first heard that the Queen had died.

### **DJs choose sad songs to mark the Queen's death**

Hundreds of radio DJs across the country had to decide what songs to play following the announcement of the Queen's death.

Most DJs say they didn't want to play music which was too happy because the country was mourning.

I asked Georgy Jamieson, who presents a local radio programme for the BBC, what music was played on the day the Queen died.

*Georgy Jamieson: It's a much more somber and slower playlist, and we are continuing with that until after the funeral.*

She says the first song played after the announcement of the Queen's death was Eva Cassidy's 'Songbird'.
