Phone use in schools

Mobile phones are to be banned in schools in England.

The government has issued new guidance for teachers to introduce rules which will stop pupils using their phones.

The government says the ban will 'minimise disruption and improve behaviour'.

Here's the Education Secretary Gillian Keegan talking to ITV's Good Morning Programme.

Keegan: We want children to be there socialising, making friends, creating those relationships, not sat there on their mobile phones.

Misogyny on social media

Now, what sort of videos do you see on social media?

Researchers at University College London and the University of Kent have discovered that some social media platforms are pushing sexist and misogynistic content.

In their study, they found the amount of misogynistic content in the "For You" page of TikTok accounts quadrupled in just five days.

Doctor Kaitlyn Regehr, who worked on the report, said that "Algorithmic processes on TikTok and other social media sites target people's vulnerabilities – such as loneliness or feelings of loss of control – and gamify harmful content"

So what do young people in the UK think about this? Let's find out. I first spoke with Elle.

Carrie: Have you seen any misogynistic content on TikTok or elsewhere?

Elle: I definitely have seen a lot of, misogynistic content on TikTok recently. A lot of it comes in the form of podcasts. And I think they sort of disguise it under the terms of 'High Value Man Productions' and podcasts, etc. But a lot of that includes being very misogynistic towards women.

I also spoke with Darren.

Darren: Luckily for me, I've never seen misogynistic content on my social media page in its original form. Someone stitched it or someone's reacting to it, and that's how I see it. However, you can't deny that that still is sharing that content around and giving that content engagement.

Carrie: And what do you think about this report, and about this content on social media being amplified?

Darren: I'm not sure why so many people are taken by this. I guess it's people who maybe are disenfranchised with life. And this is the first thing they've seen that's kind of made sense that they could put the blame on to.
